News and Views: Results year over year continue to be very favorable, YTD April 2018 vs YTD April 2017 for both Council and Home Corp are within our fiscal budgets. Buy vs gross % continue as “Best in Class”. The average past 3 months gross vs spend averaged 34% or 17% better, vs the industry average of 41%, April set a record at 29%. Home Corp. will continue to increase their monthly rental allocation to Council. Every % of improvement = increased profits for Council. Our financial committee continues to meet each month. Mark Carr provides an update on our fiscal performance, YTD, for both Council and Home Corp. Detailed financial updates are available at monthly Council meetings. Activities in May = 47 and continue to grow. Many organizations are booking their events/meetings well into 2018. It is very important that you contact Don Poole well in advance when booking an event.

We are also in need of a new security system to include motion detection and active monitoring. Cost to upgrade = approximately \$1,800 + a monthly monitoring charge of \$100.00. I have asked both Home Corp. and Council as well as the finance committee to look for possible cost cutting opportunities within our current budget to offset some of this cost. We will discuss further at an upcoming Council meeting.

Building Fund New Roof: So far we have received \$17,000 + from 85 individuals. Thanks to all for your contributions. Our roof campaign is considered a “Special” building fund campaign given the costs associated for this major project. (approximately \$30,000.00) We are also expected to incur additional maintenance costs to our building this year beyond the roof project and anticipate that we can cover these costs with internally. Our roof campaign will run through July 2018. REMINDER: All contributions are tax deductible. Additional updates and reminders will be forthcoming.

Degree Updates: We conducted a first degree on April 24th—11 new members were admitted. Membership Cards: All remaining membership cards that were not picked up at The Knights were mailed to respective Brothers. If you did not receive your card please contact Mark Carr @ markcarr16yahoo.com or call Mark at 315 729-1420.

We will conduct 2 additional First and Second degrees in 2018. Details to follow. Contacts: 1st and 2nd Degree Degree - Jack Baraczek at 315-415-5325, Bruce Sherman 315 567-9677, Joe LoPiccolo, 315-246-8943, ASAP, for details. Pre-registration is required.

By-Laws: Our Advocate, Patrick Carbonaro, has advised me that the current BY-Laws for both Council and Home Corp. require updating. Patrick has also reviewed same with our former Advocate, John Rossi. We will be working closely with Patrick, Jeff Gage, Mark Carr, Bruce Sherman, Pat Crawford, John Montone and Alex Vanderpool to begin the updating process. As a guide we will follow the current BY-Law and Charter Constitution Laws received by Supreme. This is a significant process and work is still underway to complete. We will continue to update on progress in future newsletters and Council meetings.

Additional Council members: Our goal will be to add 50 new 1st Degree members in 2018. This will require adding 12-14 new members each quarter. We will also encourage current 2nd and 3rd Degree Members to move to the net level. The Ladies Auxiliary has also increased their membership to 170 and anticipate continued growth in 2018.

New look: Improvements and reconfigurations continue at Council. Reconfiguration of the back office will complete our updating by year end. Volunteers needed for some sweat equity to refresh the outside of our building along with some painting and general housekeeping. We have completed a housecleaning day at the Knights on Sunday April 15. The stock room and kitchen were the targets. We will also have to repair and paint the common wall we share with Eliminator Auto in back of the Knights. I am working out the details with Mike Antonacci.



NOTE: Use of our facility by members and guests is “Welcome” - please police all areas that are used and ensure that all items used are returned to their original location(s). Thank you.

Events: It is very important that you schedule your event “ASAP” with Don Poole. Depending on the event, we can also host multiple events at the same time. We continue to host simultaneous events in the front room + the main bar area + the back room.

Virtue of the Month– May 2018

Responsibility

The Dominican Sisters of St Cecilia define the virtue of responsibility as being “reliable in your duties and accountable in your action”. A responsible adulthood begins by being a responsible child. Modern research on leadership shows us that the most successful leaders take full responsibility for the failures of their team and share the glory for any successes. One of the most success training models for this type of responsible leadership is called entitled servant leadership and the best practitioner ever of it was Jesus Christ.

Teaching responsibility to our children can then get a good start by getting children from an early age to truly know the person of Christ in the scriptures. They could then know how to act responsibly in any situation by asking themselves; What Would Jesus Do. When there is an unresolved situation you can help them form this habit by you asking first WWJD and then helping them formulate the right answer based on the actions of Christ. Of course, to do this successfully will also require you modeling responsible behavior and later talking to them about it. Remember in this age of “helicopter parenting” swooping in to take away responsibility for your child’s actions or projecting their blame on others only disempowers them from a responsible and successful adulthood.

ROME, ITALY - On Sunday afternoon Pope Francis paid a visit to the Basilica of Santa Sofia home to Rome's Greek-Catholic Community of Ukrainians.

Three models of the Ukrainian Churchmen

The Pope exchanged greetings with the Major Archbishop of Kiev, Sviatoslav Shevchuk, and in his address the Pontiff recalled the great models of Cardinal Josyp Slipyi, Salesian Ukrainian Bishop Stepan Czmil, and Cardinal Lubomyr Husar, Major Archbishop of the Greek-Catholic Church of Ukraine.

The Pope also paid a visit to the crypt to pray at the tomb of Salesian Ukrainian Bishop Czmil. He described the Bishop as "a person who has done me so much good", explaining that when he was a boy, in Argentina, he was taught by him, "to

serve at Mass, to read your alphabet, from him I learned the beauty of your liturgy, from its stories the living testimony of how much faith has been tried and forged in the midst of the terrible atheistic persecutions of the last century".

Conflict in Ukraine

During his address Pope Francis noted the ongoing conflict in Ukraine and the suffering of the people there saying, "I am here today to tell you all that I am close to you: close with my heart, with my prayers, and when I celebrate Mass."

He then prayed that the weapons of war would be silenced.

The Pope also noted the numerous Ukrainian women of great faith, courage and charity, telling them, "you are precious and you bring to many Italian families the proclamation of God." ■

RELIGIOUS PERSPECTIVE

The precision of Catholic Faith is in serious contrast with many opinions prevalent today: especially any opinion that would even hint at the idea that one religion was as good as another. Consider the precision of our Faith from the viewpoint of the prophecies in the Old Testament.

God had made many promises in the Old Testament: to Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, David, Isaiah, Elia. And our Lord made repeated references to these promises. His words always show a depth of perspective and sharp penetration. Consider a few: When Christ said that Abraham rejoiced to be able to see the day of Christ; that he saw it and was glad, our Lord was laying the groundwork for pointing out that God's great promise to Abraham was fulfilled in Christ. God had told Abraham that in his seed all the nations of the world would be blessed. It is in Jesus Christ, of the seed of Abraham according to His Humanity, but also the Eternal Son of God according to His Divinity, that this promise is fulfilled. Hence, Christ could say that before Abraham came to be, Christ is.

One day our Lord asked how David could call the Christ Lord, since the Christ was to be his (David's son).

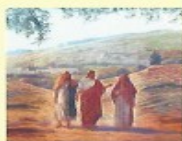
